Choices after Year 11...

All school leavers in the UK have to do one of the following options after completing their GCSE's in school;

- 1 Continue in education at a 6th Form
- 2 Continue in education at a College
- 3 Begin an Apprenticeship (work-based training)
- Throughout Year 10 & 11 you need to find out as much as you can about the options and which is going to be best for you.
- In these uncertain times it is more important than ever to have a plan and a 'back up' plan. If you research all the options it will be easier to make decisions if you need to change your plan.

Qualifications Explained

Different qualifications test your skills and knowledge in different ways, there are so many to choose from. Higher qualifications will lead to a more varied and rewarding career over your lifetime.

5&6	Higher Apprenticeship Degree Apprenticeship	Workplace & training provider or university	18+

Apprenticeships

- Level 2, 3, 4 & 5 (Intermediate, Advanced, Higher & Degree)
- Work-based learning
- 80% work & 20% college/training provider
- Requirements vary depending on level
- Earn an hourly wage £4.15 (for under 18 years old)
- Qualification is connected to a specific job or industry
- You will gain work experience plus academic qualifications
- Apprenticeships can lead to higher level apprenticeships or study & employment.

Where can I do an apprenticeship?

You need to have a job with an employer **AND** a place at a college or training provider.

A Levels (Advanced Levels)

- 'Level 3' Qualifications
- Study over 2 years
- Choose 3 separate subjects
- Assessment by exams at the end of two years
- Some subjects are essential for specific careers (EG. Sciences for medicine)
- If you are planning to go to university, check which A Levels are preferred for your chosen course
- A Levels can lead to University, apprenticeships and employment
- Requirements: Four GCSEs grade 4 and above (including 4's English Language or Maths)

Vocational Qualifications (BTECs)

- Offered at Level 1, 2 or 3
- Requirements vary—GCSEs grade 4 and above preferred
- 'Vocational' means connected to a specific job or industry
- Learn specific skills for the workplace
- Study for 1 or 2 years
- Can combine BTECs with A Levels at 6th Form
- At colleges you only choose 1 subject
- Includes work experience
- No exams assessed by coursework
- Can lead to University (with enough UCAS points) apprenticeships & employment.
