
OLCC follows the OCR syllabus. There are three exams, taken at the end of Year 13:

- England 1485-1558 (25%)
- Germany 1919-63 (15%)
- Civil Rights in the USA 1865-1992 (40%)

You will also produce a personal and independent essay (4000 words) of your own choice – this is a chance to pursue an area that really interests you. The personal study is worth 20% of the final mark.









You'll study a variety of British, European and World History from different periods and eras, including a combination of 'depth' and 'thematic' study.

You'll be familiar with some of the history we study, but there's also lots of new and very interesting topics to discover!



Hello, I'm Mr. Howarth, Head of History here at OLCC. I'll be teaching you for the Year 12 unit on Germany 1919-63, and helping you with your planning and preparation towards your personal study.
I've been teaching history since the end of the 20th Century, so I suppose that makes me some kind of artefact from the past!

I studied History and Politics at Lancaster University, and remain fascinated by the subject, and the history of Germany in particular. I'm always learning and finding out more about this really interesting and important period of history.

We are living through momentous times that students in the future will no doubt be stunned by. I'm sure you will agree that knowing about the past is the best way to understand the present, and the future!

How is History taught?


Students will have 9 lessons of history a fortnight divided between the different teachers and units.

You'll enjoy lessons taught in History classrooms and in small groups.

You'll be well equipped with textbooks and course materials, and expected to do lots of reading and your own personal research.

There'll be lots of advice and practice on writing essays and answering exam questions.

We'll use a variety of approaches including group work, discussion and debate, quizzes and student presentations. There'll be plenty of audio-visual stimulus and a strong focus on primary evidence and the views of different historians.







Wider opportunities:

We regularly take opportunities to improve our students' skills and knowledge through local history study. In recent years our students have been involved in history projects linked to Lancaster University, the City Museums and the National Archives.

Every year, our students are given the opportunity to become 'Ambassadors' as part of the Holocaust Educational Trust's 'Lessons from Auschwitz' project. This includes seminars in Manchester where students meet and hear the testimony of Holocaust survivors, and a visit to the camp itself in southern Poland. OLCC students who have taken part all agree it is one of their most memorable and important life experiences.






Results

In 2019, our students scored excellent average grades on the USA Paper and did better than previous students on the Tudor Paper.

All students achieved an A or a B on their personal study essay.

History A Level allows you to develop your critical thinking, research skills, analysis, evaluation, discussion and communication.




These skills are highly sought after by Universities and Employers alike.

I chose History as an A level because it was a subject I thoroughly enjoyed for GCSE and did well at, so wanted to expand upon.
