	KS5 Curriculum Overview Year 13 (USA Civil Rights)
Unit	Unit Y319: Civil Rights in the USA 1865–1992
Rationale	This unit considers the factors that helped and hindered the development of civil rights in the USA for African Americans, trade unions, Native Americans and women. It will consider how far these groups obtained civil rights in their political, social and economic spheres, and how and why progress varied over time. In particular it will assess the roles of the civil rights groups and the federal and state governments in bringing about changes as well as considering who opposed the changes and why. Students should be able to summarise developments by making links between events over the whole period (1865-1992). Students will also need identify and explain patterns of change and continuity and similarity and difference over the whole period before arriving at judgments based on their observations. As well as the key topics mentioned above there is also an in depth analysis of the three interpretation depth studies. These are Civil Rights in the Gilded Age 1875-1895, The New Deal and civil rights, Malcolm X and Black Power. The in depth section will require you to apply your contextual knowledge to evaluate two interpretations and reach a supported judgement as to which one you consider to be most valid. This unit will count for 40% of the overall marks of the final A level. Section A is an in-depth question based on two interpretations of a key event, individual or issue that forms a major part of the theme. This will be worth 30 marks. Section B is a thematic essay. Students will need to answer two out of a choice of three thematic essay questions. Each question is worth 25 marks.

1. African Americans

Know:

Their position in 1865, Reconstruction, white reaction and discrimination; the role of African Americans in gaining civil rights (e.g. Booker T Washington, Dubois, Martin Luther King, the Black Panthers); the roles of Federal (Presidents, Congress and Supreme Court) and State governments in the struggle; the role of anti and pro-civil rights groups; the Civil Rights Movement to 1992.

2. Women

Their position in 1865; the impact on women's rights of the campaign for prohibition; the campaign for women's suffrage; the New Deal; the World Wars; the rise of feminism and its opponents, Roe v Wade 1973, the campaign for the Equal Rights Amendment; changing economic and employment opportunities.

To evaluate how successful the campaign for political rights was for women between 1865 and 1992 and analyse the key turning points in their political rights To evaluate how great social and economic change was for Women between 1865 and 1992

To compare and assess historian's interpretations of the impact of the Black Power Movement on Women.

3. Native American Indians

Know:

Their position in 1865; the impact of the Plains Wars (1854–1877); the impact of the Dawes Act 1887, of the acquisition of US citizenship 1924, of the New Deal, of the American Indian Movement in the 1960s and 1970s; Native Americans and the Supreme Court; Native American pressure groups.

To evaluate how far the position of Native Americans improved in the period from 1865 to 1992

To evaluate to what extent the federal government improved the rights of Native Americans between 1865 and 1992

To evaluate the extent that Native Americans were responsible for improvements in their rights.

4. Trade Union and Labour Rights

Know:

Union and Labour rights in 1865; the impact of New Immigration and industrialisation on union development; the role of Federal governments in supporting and opposing union and labour rights; the impact of the World Wars on union and labour rights; the significance of the 1960s; Chavez and the UFW; significance of the Reagan era.

Know how

To evaluate how far the position of unions and organised labour improved in the period from 1865 to 1992

To evaluate the extent that industrial growth and economic change helped or hindered union and labour rights from 1865 to 1992.

To evaluate to what extent the federal government improved the development of Labour Rights between 1865 and 1992.

To evaluate the significance of union unity in the development of labour rights.

Malcolm X and Black Power

Know:

Nature and extent of progress in civil rights in this era. The varied impact of industrialisation African-Americans and workers, and the nature and effectiveness of their responses; nature and effectiveness of government policy towards civil rights issues including varying attitudes of Presidents, Congress and Supreme Court and State governments; the impact of Westward Expansion on civil rights: Native American Indians, women, workers and African Americans; nature and extent of north-south and east-west divides as they relate to civil rights.
