Introduction

All schools and colleges are subject to a duty under section 26 of the Counter-Terrorism and Security Act 2015 (the CTSA 2015), in the exercise of their functions, to have "due regard to the need to prevent people from being drawn into terrorism". This duty is known as the Prevent duty.

School staff are particularly important as they are in a position to identify concerns early and provide help for children, to prevent concerns from escalating. Schools and colleges and their staff form part of the wider safeguarding system for children. This system is described in statutory guidance Working Together to Safeguard Children (July 2018) and Keeping Children Safe in Education (September 2021)

Schools and colleges is work with Children's Services, the Police, Health Services and other services to promote the welfare of children and protect them from harm. Radicalisation is listed as a specific

safeguarding issue within this statutory guidance and is addressed within the Government Prevent Strategy.

The Prevent Strategy has three main objectives:

1. Tackle the causes of radicalisation and respond to the ideological challenges of terrorism

2. Safeguard and support those most at risk of radicalisation through early intervention, identifying them and offering support

3. Enable those who have already engaged in terrorism to disengage and rehabilitate

The Prevent duty is be seen as part of schools' and colleges' wider safeguarding obligations. Designated Safeguarding Leads and other senior leaders in schools is familiarise themselves with the revised Prevent duty guidance especially paragraphs 57-76, which are specifically concerned with schools. Designated safeguarding leads and other senior leaders in colleges is familiarise themselves with the Prevent duty guidance.

The guidance is set out in terms of four general themes:

- Risk Assessment
- Working in Partnership
- Staff Training
- IT and Speaker Policies

Good Practice at Our Lady's Catholic College

1. Leadership and governance

- Protecting children from the risk of radicalisation is seen as part of schools' wider safeguarding duties, and is similar in nature to protecting children from other types of harm
- Prevent implementation is led by those who have the responsibility for putting policies and procedures in place and ensuring that they are adhered to.
- Prevent can sometimes entail the sharing of sensitive information and other bodies may expect to engage with the school leadership.

2. Training

- Individual schools are best placed to assess their training needs in the light of their assessment of the risk. The Designated Safeguarding Lead undertakes face-to-face Prevent awareness training and is able to provide advice and support to other members of staff on protecting children from the risk of radicalisation.
- It is not about the mere number of staff being trained, but about the impact of the training.

3. Engagement with external partners

- As with other safeguarding activity, Prevent work often involves a range of people with breadth of experience working together. Sharing of information between professionals and local agencies is essential for effective identification, assessment and service provision. OLCC has arrangements in place which set out clearly the processes and the principles for sharing information internally and externally.
- OLCC has effective relations with local Prevent partners, including the local authority and police.

4. Curriculum - formal and informal

- OLCC helps build pupils' resilience to radicalisation by promoting positive values in particular, the fundamental British values of democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty and mutual respect and tolerance of different faiths and beliefs. Our formal curriculum is used to support positive messaging and counternarratives, for example in PSHE, history, citizenship and RE.
- Our enrichment opportunities can also be explored, such as debating societies and other opportunities for pupils to explore issues in a safe environment.

• Staff are confident in managing discussions about controversial subjects and in encouraging the development of pupils' critical thinking skills.

5. Policies and practices

• Our Child Protection Policy has relevant policies and procedures in place which can be adapted to reflect the Prevent duty, e.g. on safeguarding and child protection, visitors/speakers, external visits, IT, bookings & lettings and so on.

6. Referral pathways

• OLCC responds effectively to the identification of a concern and the subsequent actions taken. staff know who they is talk to if they identify a concern. SLT is also know how to refer and share information, using the usual safeguarding procedures and involving the relevant stakeholders such as the Local Authority and Police as appropriate.

Note: This document complements the <u>Prevent duty guidance</u> as well as the <u>Departmental advice</u> for schools and childcare providers on the Prevent duty. Also see the Department's statutory guidance <u>Keeping children safe in</u> <u>education</u> as well as <u>Working Together</u>.
